8 Drake's Almshouse

Almshouses were created to provide homes for people with little or no money. This almshouse was built by Amersham's Lord of the Manor, the Drake family.

Wee Oaks is one the smallest houses on the High Street.

The house is over 400 years old. Can you identify some of the materials it is made from?
